Foreword

The Jews of Yemen possess rich musical traditions, which have always been of interest to scholars of Jewish music, just as their unique cultural history has attracted the attention of Jewish scholars from an early stage. Interest in this culture is still alive today, half a century after the migration of most of the Jews from Yemen to Israel. Their special contribution to the development of Israeli culture, including many variants of Israeli music, is one focus of such interest. This publication of archival recordings of Yemenite Jewish music is still, therefore, considerably pertinent.

The documentation of the musical traditions of the Jews of Yemen and the ways they have changed since their immigration to Israel has been one of the most important aims of the Jewish Music Research Centre. Several scholars have investigated this subject: among the most important ones were Naomi Bahat-Ratzon and Dr. Avner Bahat, who devoted many years to meticulous and comprehensive ethnographic research among Israelis of Central Yemenite origin. A sample of their work appeared under the title 'Songs of Yemenite Jews from the Diwan' in our series *Anthology of Musical Traditions in Israel* back in 1982 (AMTI 8201). All the recordings in that record are incorporated into this new CD, sometimes in a longer version, and in the improved quality made possible by new recording technologies. To this initial selection, several additional recordings from the collections of the National Sound Archives at the Jewish National and University Library have been added. We would like to thank Naomi Bahat-Ratzon and Avner Bahat for the devoted and professional efforts, which they dedicated to the

preparation of this important selection for publication.

Most of the recordings were made by Shimon Fenigstein, former sound engineer of the National Sound Archives, back in the 1970s. Shay Drori implemented the digitalization and edited the master copies for the new edition. We thank them both for their contribution to the high quality of the recordings. We also thank Dr. Yehudah Amir for his assistance in completing the information about the poems, and Mr. Ratzon Halevi for the permission to quote from his Hebrew translation of the Arabic poems. We also thank Ruth Fried, who edited the Hebrew text with a sensitivity to details, which springs from her long acquaintance with this musical material.
